Alabama Allows Absurd Immigration Law

The fear of strict immigration laws has spread from Arizona to Alabama. Every passing day becomes increasingly difficult for the immigrants that work tedious jobs to improve the lives of their families. The passing bill makes it almost impossible for illegal immigrants to survive in the state.

Similar to the Arizona law, police officers are given the authority to arrest drivers who commit traffic violations if there is reason to believe they are in the U.S. illegally. As this was the main controversy in Arizona, Alabama's law has many controversial issues that I find to be far more detrimental.

The bill starts off by making it illegal to enter into a contract with undocumented immigrants. Soon after, it mentions that renting property to undocumented immigrants is a crime. This includes houses and apartments.



Yes, it is essential for all immigrants to become citizens, however, the process of becoming a U.S. inhabitant is expensive and time consuming.

These two issues afflict with immigrants becoming legal residents. These individuals need time to earn money in order to progress in the citizenship process.

How are they to earn money to become a citizen if Alabama does not allow them to rent shelter. A place of residence is needed in order to rest and prepare for workdays. Many of these individuals cannot afford to buy homes, so that is out of

the question. These issues lead us to the next part of the bill. It is now illegal for Alabama business owners to hire undocumented workers. A business that is cited for hiring illegal workers can have its business license revoked. Adding to this section, Businesses within Alabama must run workers names and information through a federal system (E-Verify) to obtain their legal status.

With these restrictions placed on businesses, many immigrants are not showing up for work. Alabama is a state of great agriculture output. The absence of these workers is greatly af-

fecting the harvesting of crops. As the signing of the bill took place, Aliens literally disappeared overnight. Fear has overwhelmed them into hiding and some have even left the state.

Many blame undocumented workers for the lack of jobs available within America. Now there are plenty of jobs available harvesting crops but yet acres are rotting due to the missing workers. This shows that these individuals perform tasks that normal citizens would not.

Over time the decreased amount of illegal aliens can affect America's economy. Even

at this moment, America is losing money due to the decaying crops unharvested in the fields. Prisoners from Alabama jails are now being used to pick the crops.

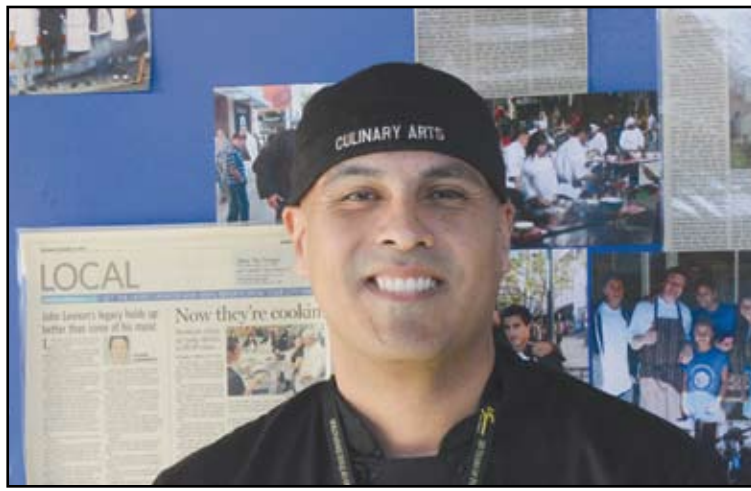
Chef Luna Speaks of His Love for Food

For you to know what these terms mean when cooking the pie.

"Bain Marie"-Hot water bath

"Temper"-Sensitive process

Making the Chocolate Inside the Pie

Steps:

Step 1: 1 cup of chocolate morsels

Melt over "Bain Marie"

Step 2: 2 eggs- Do not heat! You must temper

Step 3: 1 cup of sugar - whistle all 3 together slowly

Step 4: 1/2 cup of melted butter (while still mixing)

Step 5: 1/2 cup of flour (while mixing slowly)

Step 6: 1 Tbl vanilla

Step 7: 1 cup of chopped delains (While still mixing)

Bake @ 350 for 50 mins

Pie Shell+Add+Egg wash

2 1/2 cups of A.P. flour

Plus extra for rolling

1 cup or 2 sticks or 8 oz of unsalted butter

Very cold, cut into 1/2 inch cubes

1 tsp of salt

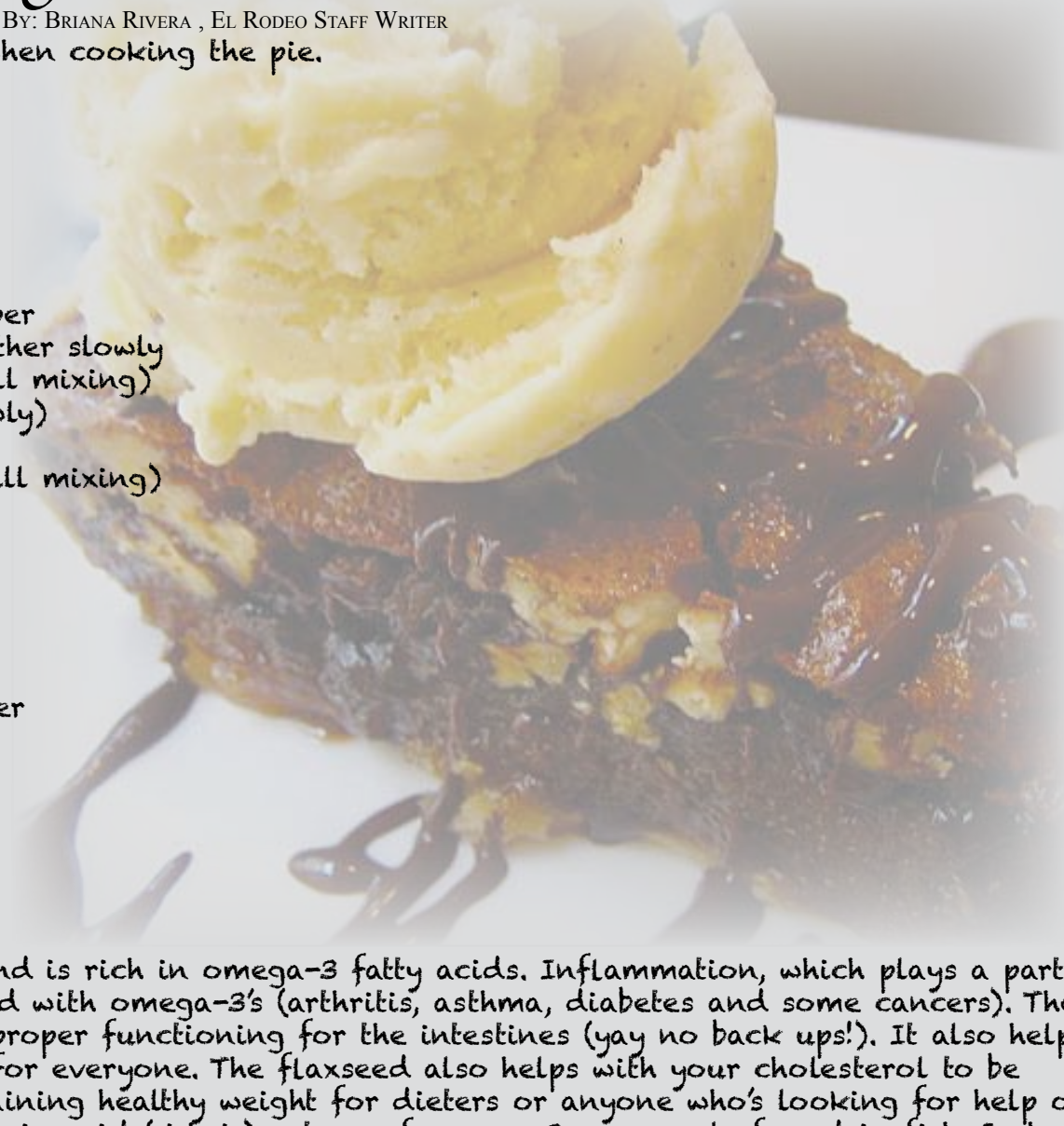
1 tsp of sugar

4-8 tbl of ice water

Optional: sprinkle chopped nuts in crust

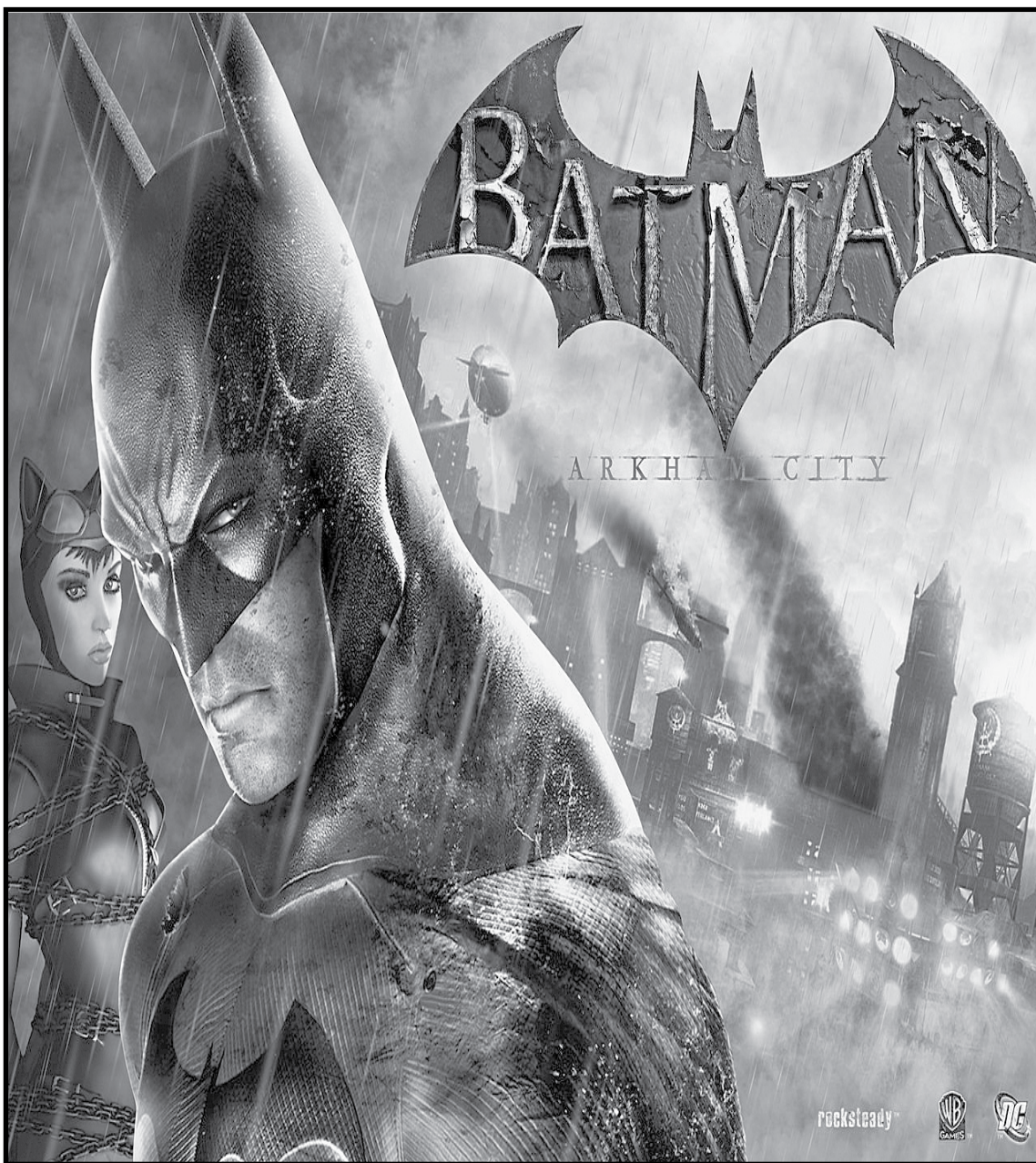
Batman: Arkham City Game Review
