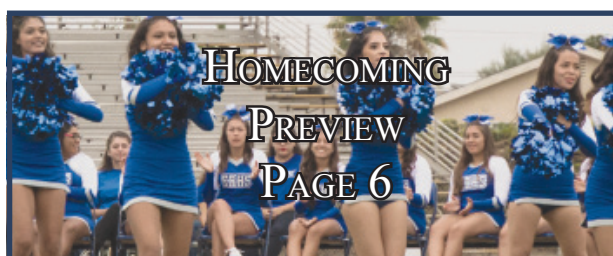

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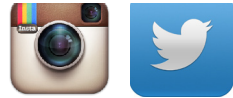

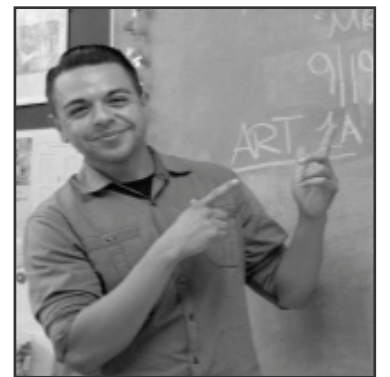

AP Computer Science offered for the first time at El Rancho

AP Computer Science Principles better known as AP CSP is a new class here at El Rancho High and nationwide. AP CSP gives students the foundations of computer science and has students explore how computing and technology can change the world around us. According to the College Board says that the class has a unique focus on creative problem solving and real-world applications.

"Computers are integrated into our society. Computer science is an extra set of tools that people can apply in their regular lives" says AP CSP teacher, Mr. Crone. AP CSP prepares students for college and future careers such as a software applications developer, computer systems analyst, Web developer, and much more. After college, students can even go straight into working for big technology companies such as Google and Microsoft.

The class involves writing code to make apps, specifically for Android systems, and covering computer science topics like the internet, what is it? How does

it work? Also subjects like cyber security. This class studies how the evolution of technology has affected our society and culture. Mr. Crone says "computers are changing our lives."

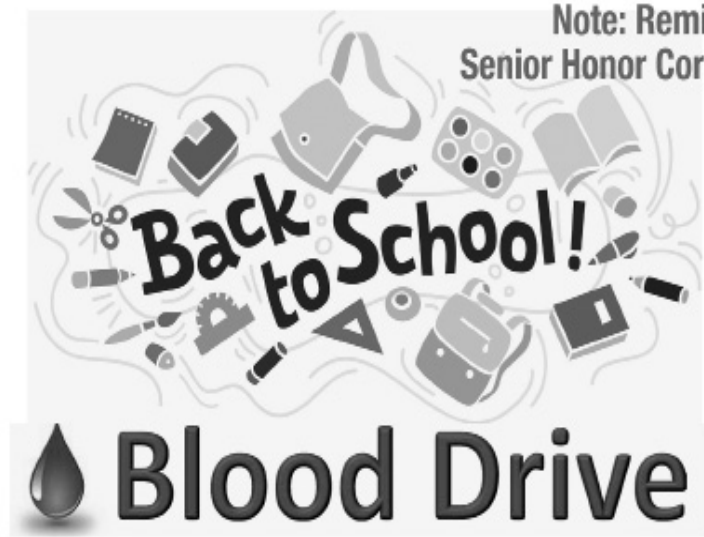
AP CSP has been in the works since 2008 and is backed by the National Science Foundation. The College Board is working with 50 leading high school and graduate computer science educators who have tested the course in their classes, to give students an engaging learning experience.

AP CSP student, Jose Alcalá, in Mr. Crone's first period class, said he wanted to join the class because he wants to grasp the fundamentals of computers. He also mentioned that they code in a language called Blockly, though he wishes they can learn more languages like JavaScript, C++, Python and more. "I enjoy AP CSP, but I'm kind of nervous for the AP test. Hopefully, Mr. Crone's guidance will be a big help."
