family. The whole process of deciding who receives the awards begins with the teachers. The entire staff nominates who he or she believes is worthy, and then all


of the nominations are gathered.

Mr. McMullen Bids Farewell to El Rancho

All good things must come to an end, and for Mr. Timothy McMullen and his forty-year teaching career, the end of the road has arrived.

Mr. McMullen began teaching in 1971 as a substitute teacher in the Whittier, El Rancho, and Rowland school district. He taught at Sierra, Santa Fe, and La Serna, and then retired to be a professional folk singer. In 1976 he arrived at El Rancho High school, and in 1978 he ob-

tained a permanent position at the Ranch. Six presidents and 33 years later El Rancho bids farewell to one of its finest teachers.

Although he will no longer be here his influence will remain, as his contributions to El Rancho are astonishing.

One of Mr. McMullen's fondest memories is "having the opportunity to create new classes." Mystery Murder/Science Fiction, Video Production, Speech, Vista, and Creative Writing are classes that were formed as a result of Mr. McMullen.

result of Mr. McMullen. Mr. McMullen was also in charge of running the interclass debates and he was also the head of *El Rodeo*.

He is also the last active, and one of the original members of the ABA (Anderson Basketball Association), which for the last 20 years has had teachers playing during lunch.

English is perhaps what Mc-Mullen is most known for; he has been teaching English and English Honors for over two decades.

Spending some of his tenure here teaching Honors with Mr. Anderson and the retired Mrs. Clemons. Mr. McMullen truly has a passion for sharing literature as he stated, "It was a privilege to share things you've discovered."

He certainly has affected the lives of many of his students, since former students return to thank him.

Some students, as he said, "return to become great teachers." Some of those include Ms. Kemp, Mrs. Padilla, and Mrs. Lam. "What I remember about junior team and Mr. McMullen is the fact that it was the best preparation for college." says Mrs. Padilla. Former students and current teachers said, "What I remember most about Mr. McMullen is how passionate he was about what he teaches and how he was very creative. He was the best poetry teacher I've ever had"

Mr. McMullen's influence also reached out to his colleagues, as he was known as a great mentor.

"He has given so much to not only the students, but the teachers of El Rancho as well. He has served as a mentor, Instructional Manager, and Union Representative," said Mrs. Padilla. Fellow English teacher, Mr. Sorenson said that McMullen is a, "great Inspiration and the person I would most like to be."

Former student Mrs. Lam also said, "He was my mentor my first year teaching here, and I never felt threatened by him, he wanted me to be successful."

"The interaction and the opportunity to challenge students to think" are two things

he enjoyed, and he will be missed greatly when he retires.

Retirement does not mean Mr. McMullen will not be keeping busy, as he still has many "miles to go before he sleeps."

His plans for the future are "Video editing, playing my own original music, traveling, and lots of reading."

McMullen has left his mark on El Rancho High School and hopes that students will continue to strive to succeed.

"Seek truth, speak truth," said McMullen. "The trouble with normal is it's always getting worse, so don't be normal."

Creative Musicians, Savvy Businesswomen

From humble beginnings in Calgary, Alberta in the late 1990s, the Canadian twin sister duo Tegan Quin and Sara Quin have developed one the of the most devoted fan bases in all of Indie-Pop with their comedic on-stage banter, confessional lyrics, and catchy songs, such as "Walking with a Ghost," "Back in Your Head," and "Living Room."

The Quin twins are not only creative musicians, but also savvy businesswomen, for they have managed to maintain a career in the music industry without the help of a largely known label. Tegan and Sara have repeatedly said that they enjoy the business side of the industry as much as the creative side, an attribute that some musicians lack.

Early on in their career that begun in 1999, the Quin twins

released their first record, Under Feet Like Ours. The duo made clear that their goal as musicians was to seek and obsessively discuss love until the end of time. A year later, Neil Young took note and signed the duo to his indie record label, allowing the two to maintain creative control over every piece they release.

Subsequent to Under Feet Like Ours, Tegan and Sara have released five other albums, the most recent, Sainthood, which was released in 2009. The sixth album from the duo focuses on true and tested themes of love and the sentiments it conjures: devotion, delusion, courtship, all of which are endured with the hope to be noticed by the individual with whom one's affection lies.

Sainthood carries a more upbeat tune, but still has the heartwrenching lyrics that arguably draw so many fans to the duo. Pulling inspiration from their own

finalized- there'd been talk about maybe playing in Paris or something else," Mason told Rolling Stone about the reunion. "So it was nice to get there and see that David was there."

The three then went to back stage room to have light pre-show dinner.

Mason then took his seat on the arena to witness the full stage and light show of The Wall.

"It was mind blowing good," Mason said. "It's a shame in a way... if you could turn the clock back and have access to that short of technology, 40, 30, years ago, it would've been fantastic. I mean, it's interesting because I think he Wall has been brought up to date. When you look at the stage sets and the lighting that goes on now, it so eclipses what used to do."

Gilmour used his own black Fender Stratocaster to play lead guitar on "Comfortably Numb." He also performed for "Outside the Wall" with his mandolin

along with Mason playing his tambourine (Mason was asked half an hour before the show to perform "Outside the Wall").

It was surprising to Mason as the news blasted online. "Incredibly, it's just three old blokes getting together for a moment, really odd. But if that's what people like then that's great," said Mason.

This of course set hope for a full Pink Floyd reunion tour, but there have been rumors of Waters having no desire to reunite the band ever again.

"I'm really glad that I was in the and for the twenty years that I was in it and I really enjoyed it," said Waters "I think we did some great work together but I have no wish to do it ever again."

This was the second time Pink Floyd performed on stage together in the last thirty years, the first time since 2005s Live 8 concert.

Videos of the reunion are posted on various website made by fans using their cellphones to record.



Day one took place on the evening of Wednesday, June 1st, at the annual Project Fair. Mr Hartman's senior honors classes



The room was divided into sections, with each section displaying hand-crafted banners, posters, and a table full of advocating seniors ready to overwhelm one with information regarding their topic.

"The projects showed an amazing depth and demonstrated true global awareness," says Ms Chodos.

Day two were the teach-ins, which took place in the faculty center throughout the school day on Thursday, June 2nd. Armed with Power Point presentations, display boards, and videos, the seniors educated groups of students on their topics. Each period held two teach-ins, with each session consisting of 45 minutes and ending with an interactive activity for the audience.

"It was a beautiful experience interacting with our fellow classmates doing something that could possibly change the world," says senior Nathalie Cepeda. "The teach-ins helped me realize that one person can have an impact on a group of students and possibly make a change."

Over the past few months, the students learned about various human rights violations. From



The first Teen Court in Los Angeles County was served with a full house, with additional number of people standing up because of no more seats, at the Pico Rivera City of Chambers City Hall.

Two cases were heard with eighteen El Rancho students who served as jurors in each separate case.

"I felt that I had power in the court because I was part of choosing the sentence," said senior Patty Bermudez.

The first case was addressed to junior high school student Louise F. who was caught tagging on a Downey City pole with a marker that he bought for two dollars from a friend.

Louise admitted that his tagging was a bad hobby. It was not his prime intention to tag but wanted to approach art in a different way.

"I tagged up Theory SUFKtoshowthattagginggang that I want to be part of them,"



said Louise. "Even though I don't know what it means. I still tagged that on the pole."

The verdict was guilty of a misdemeanor. Parts of Louises' sentence are sixty hours of community service and to have no possession of markers, sketching tools or spray paint.

Francine T., was caught with the possession of the drug by search dog at California High School.

"One being that schools are having difficulty adapting that this is a real court and for El Rancho students having to hear court cases for students that they may know.


"We are definitely going to have problems with schools in partnering with us in this court system because they do not thing that this is an official court," continued Elias.

"Drama takes a lot of work," she says. "It's kind of like a job, except I don't get paid."




